On December 21, 1913, Arthur Wynne, a journalist from Liverpool, England, published a "word-cross" puzzle in the New York World that embodied most of the features of the genre as we know it. This game is frequently cited as the first crossword puzzle, and Wynne as the inventor. Later, the name of the game was changed to "crossword"


