

Guest Speaker

Our guest speaker this month was Juliet Grist, who heads up Denmark Futures Ltd in a voluntary capacity. Juliet was accompanied by her friend May.

Denmark Futures began as a result of Covid, and the need for a coordinating body for the many local not for profit organisations. The current focus of Denmark Futures is to find out what seniors in Denmark need in order to

thrive. Considering the fact that there are more people in Denmark over 55 than the State average, and that this group is growing faster than the State average, it is timely to look at this group's needs.

To get feedback from seniors themselves, Denmark Futures hosted a forum at the Civic Centre recently. As a follow up, they came to speak to our club in order to garner our thoughts on the subject. Juliet informed us that a pressing problem for seniors in Denmark is rental housing, especially downsizing options near to town. Another significant problem for this group is food, with 15% of those seniors attending hospital being malnourished.

Access to specialist health and knowing what is on offer is also a problem, and to address this, the group is publishing an information booklet for seniors.

Lack of available transport is an issue and to address this, the CRC is investigating providing an electric bus, which can be driven by car licence holders.

Juliet feels that there is a need for an aged citizens' advocate in Denmark. There was previously an Over 50s group, but we currently have no organisation to promote our interests. Denmark Futures looks after the full range of Denmark citizens, but cannot champion our interests alone.

Chris Watkins thanked Juliet and suggested that as Probus members, we could go along to Shire Council meetings and make Councillors more aware of our needs. It is certainly in our interest to see that some of the issues of our eldest citizens are dealt with to make Denmark a more livable town for those who have become vulnerable.

Inspired by this experience, Steve transferred his teaching job from Perth to Albany and purchased a 75 acre farm in Denmark WA in 1980. He commuted from the farm to teach at Albany Senior High School until he retired.



Steve met Kerry, a fellow school teacher and single parent, on a blind date in 1990, and they have been partners ever since. The couple enjoyed travelling extensively during school holidays to various destinations including the UK, Europe, Canada, the USA and New Zealand. They married in 2014 and moved into town two years ago, while Steve's daughter and granddaughter took over living at his farm, where he remains actively involved.

Kerry's son, partner and daughter reside in Perth, and Stephen and Kerry frequently visit them. They also enjoy road tripping in their off-road camper or caravan during the cooler months.

I've kept on searching for a heart of gold.


I've sought shelter from the storm, I've sat on the dock of the bay. I've rocked around the clock, on a sunshiny day.

Recipe of the month

STEPHANIE'S LEMON SYRUP CAKE



~ 24cm ring tin ~ 150g unsalted butter, soft 3 lemons, zest only 1/2 vanilla pod, seeds only 3 eggs 160g SR flour 50ml milk

Syrup

120g icing sugar 3 lemons, juice only

Serve

300ml thickened cream, lightly whipped 20g pistachios, finely chopped

Preheat oven to 165C, line and grease cake tin and set aside.

In a clean bowl, beat butter, sugar, zest and vanilla until pale and fluffy, 3 to 5 minutes.

Add eggs, one at a time, making sure each is incorporated before the next is added.

Fold in flour, followed by milk, mixing until combined.

If the mix is a little stiff, add a dash more milk.

Pour mix into tin, spreading evenly.

Pop into oven and bake 40 to 50 minutes or until skewer comes out clean.

Remove from oven and allow to stand in tin.

To make syrup, heat, sugar, and juice over medium heat, cooking until liquid reduces by half.

Using a skewer, randomly prick holes into top of warm cake. Gently pour syrup over whole of cake and leave to cool. Once cool, remove from tin and top with cream and pistachios.
