# FEBRUARY SPEAKER JANE JAMES



Our featured speaker at February's meeting was well known Denmark identity Dr Jane James. She had kindly agreed to talk to us about her volunteer work in Tanzania over the last 10 years.

She 'fell into' this significant part of her life after breaking her leg on a Tasmania rocky outcrop. Hours of hobbling back to base must have been agonizing and it was while being cared for by nursing staff there that the subject of a small hospital in Tanzania which needed assistance was first broached. Jane claims that she resisted all pleas as strongly as she could until she found herself visiting and volunteering her help with others at the hospital of Dr Winani on an annual basis over the past 10 years.

The targeted work is a de worming program which will significantly boost the general health of the children. Jane showed where there had been the recent outbreak of Ebola (the other side of the continent) and asked us to compare the loss of life associated with the curse of Malaria which killed or debilitated millions. She had bought many slides to show us the actual location of the hospital and other treatment centres. Her slides showed nursing conditions and the sometimes baffling provision of infrastructure which was never subsequently commissioned. There were slides of some of the many characters who clearly make her work there such a significant part of her life - patients, work colleagues and specific members of the community such as the little boy, badly burned, who would be treated by an Australian plastic surgeon. Over the years she has taken other members of her family and friends and colleagues to Dr Winani's hospital to join the established volunteer group. Together

they have helped the community improve their lives on many levels. Beekeeping techniques – the traditional way of smashing the gourd the bees had built their hives in being unsustainable – were introduced by Jane's husband David who helped them construct reusable hives and set up a donated separator. Another group member is working on fish farming ponds. Digging wells for clean water will pay huge health benefits.

Dr James gave her talk wearing a semi traditional Tanzania national dress with puffed sleeves and a peplum that had been presented to her...The final slide was of her goodbye walk on the evening before her return to Australia. She had given us a very vivid picture of the community and the people who live there and we could appreciate her regret in leaving them for another year.

On February 10<sup>th</sup> on behalf of our club I attended the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Denmark Probus Club.


It started with the meeting at 10am which was chaired by Bill, Fifty members attended along with several invited guests.


